HIGHLIGHTS

A PERSONAL VIEW OF AUTISM

On the following pages Thomas Madar offers a personal view of the characteristics of autism and their possible causes, advantages and disadvantages.

The Primary Characteristics of Asperger Syndrome

Introduction

Listed below are what I believe to be 10 primary characteristics of people with Asperger Syndrome. Though they certainly feature in my life, the acceptance of these characteristics as fact is subject to verification.

A. A difficulty in picking up the unwritten rules of society

This difficulty is caused by an impairment in the way the brain receives and processes incoming implicit information which people use to conform to the unwritten rules of society. The affected people will fail to automatically acquire the many implicit rules of living, making it necessary for him to be explicitly instructed. Thus these rules are learned in the same way as an academic subject. This characteristics is modelled in Fig 1.

Advantages

The person may display a surprising degree of originality in many ways by not being so bound by the rules of society.

Disadvantages

The person will have difficulty in internalizing unwritten rules and facts governing the following areas and more:

- a) Dress, appearance and personal hygiene
- b) Living independently (cleaning, laundry, shopping, cooking, management of personal finances).
- c) Tastes of fashion (music, dress etc).
- d) Interpersonal interaction (social behaviour, interpersonal conversation).
- e) Finding a job.

This will make the skills of living independently and making friends hard to acquire.

The person will be naive to the point of social embarrassment when presented with a joke or a figure of speech which demands knowledge of an obvious fact which he/she has not yet acquired.

B. A difficulty in picking up non verbal signals from others

This difficulty is caused by an impairment in the brain's ability to sense non verbal signals (eg emotional states) from other people. This difficulty is modelled in Fig 1.

Advantages

None.

Disadvantages

The person will miss signals which cause others to adjust their verbal communication to the recipient's age, status or their emotional state, and so will appear to lack empathy.

Without the ability to pick up tell tale danger signals, the person will be fair gain to unscrupulous people.

The person is impaired in interpreting figures of speech and some jokes because he/she has difficulty perceiving the in-context signals of the speaker. This makes him/her appear naive and can cause social embarrassment.

C. A difficulty in perceiving what other people are thinking of or will think in given situations.

This difficulty is caused by a peculiarity of personal make-up. When engaging in an activity which affects other people (for example, writing a letter), the person is unlikely to have their future thoughts of his/her mind. Thus he/she is not restrained from executing that activity in an offensive or peculiar way ... with rejecting consequences.

Advantages

The person is likely to be brutally honest when the situation deserves it. For example, an obnoxious parent-in-law makes a real nuisance of him/herself when staying at a child's home, departs, then rings up and asks if he/she will be missed, then that parent will get a well deserved 'no' rather than a white lie 'yes'.

Disadvantages

The person is more likely to commit a peculiar or offensive act or habit because he/she will not realise its impact on others. This will result in a degree of disapproval, rejection and isolation from other people and will adversely affect social and career prospects.

The person has difficulty in detecting dishonesty and so very vulnerable to being 'taken for a ride' by unscrupulous people.

D. A difficulty in formulating and verbalizing communicable thoughts.

This difficulty is caused by an impairment in the way the brain formulates thoughts and converts them into a linear sequence of words in response to a stimulus such as criticism, then presenting these at the right speed, with the right tone of voice, and accompanied by appropriate non verbal signals for the maximum impact. This characteristic is modelled in Fig 2.

Advantages

A difficulty in conversation formulation and delivery means that the affected person is quiet. In many situations, particularly in the office, this is a welcome attribute.

Disadvantages

Any form of communication impediment is likely to radiate an impression of low intelligence, lack of confidence, dishonesty etc and so will render the person liable to be discriminated against and be subject to a degree of social isolation.

The person has great difficulty in occupations requiring advanced communication, leadership and/or persuasion skills, for example, school teacher, manager, salesman.

The person has difficulty in defending him/herself against criticism and winning verbal arguments and so is likely to lose face and be trodden on.

The person has difficulty in formulating effective answers to job interview questions unless thoroughly prepared for and rehearsed in advance.

The person has difficulty in communicating a need or an emotion effectively, resulting in the frustration of this not being met.

The person is likely to have difficulty in arranging words and sentences for written work such as course essays, resulting in a long completion time.

E. A raised anxiety state

This characteristic is caused by a feature of the person's make-up and may be aggravated by the problems by characteristics A-D in the person's life.

Advantages

A fear of the consequences of being disorganised will make the person very organised in everything he/she arranges. In most situations, this is as very welcome trait.

A fear of the consequences of being incautious will make the person exercise extreme caution in what he/she does.

A fear of the consequences of dishonesty will make the person honest and of high integrity, very welcome in our times.

Disadvantages

A fear of the consequences of retaliation will make the person hesitate to defend himself or be nasty when the situation calls for it. This makes him/her vulnerable to be trodden over by stronger people and is a disadvantage in any occupation requiring good leadership and/or persuasion skills.

An impression of chronic anxiety implies social inferiority to some people.

The person becomes unreasonably worried when something does not go according to plan, for example, a normally punctual bus being late.

Other fears may bring other restrictions in the life of the person, for example, a fear of crowded places restricting access to shopping centres on Saturdays.

F. Sensitivity to small discrepancies

This characteristic is caused by a feature of the person's make-up, but may be aggravated by anxiety, and results in the person being acutely sensitive to anything which is even slightly out of order.

Advantages

The person is very scrupulous in anything which he/she does, paying great attention to detail to produce a high quality piece of work.

Disadvantage

Scrupulous attention to detail takes time and is disadvantageous in situations where time is money and/or crucial tight deadlines have to be met.

Small annoyances, for example, a shop sold out of a favourite brand of soap, may cause the person severe irritability and, occasionally, loss temper.

G. Concentration difficulty

This difficulty is caused by an impairment in the ability of the brain to subdue other thoughts in order to focus attention on a particular task for a sustained period of time. The person daydreams and has difficulty in restraining his/her mind from wandering onto other things when trying to do a piece of written work or listening to a lecture.

Advantages

None.

Disadvantages

Poor concentration lengthens the time taken and is disadvantageous in situations where time is money and/or crucial tight deadlines have to be met.

Poor concentration plays havoc with the input of information from lectures.

H. Clumsiness at sports

This difficulty is caused by a impairment in the brain's ability to finely co-ordinate a person's body movements when swimming, jumping, throwing an object or catching one. The person has difficulty in mastering sports and games requiring more than the simplest co-ordinated body movements.

Advantages

The person is more likely to be excused games (an often hated activity) at school.

Disadvantages

Likely lead to social isolation and low status in cultures where prowess in sport is valued.

I. A very focused set of interest

This characteristic is caused by a feature in the person's make up. The person has a keen interest in a very highly specialised area, fro example, the advertising and packaging of sweets.

Advantages

The specialism may be the basis of a worthwhile hobby, better tha watching television.

The specialism may lead to some good career openings.

Disadvantages

The person may be regarded as peculiar by general society.

Concentration on the specialism lead to a lack of breadth of general knowledge.

J. Islands of extraordinary ability

This characteristic is caused by an extraordinary efficiency in one or more areas of the brain not affected by characteristics A,B,C,D,G and H, and results in sometimes a very superior ability in a particular area. These may range from an above average ability to recall the prices of goods in shops to extraordinary gifts in music and painting.

Advantages

The gift(s) will compensate for the person's disabilities, and enable him/her to contribute effectively to society. An effective path to fulfilling employment.

Disadvantages

None

Conclusion

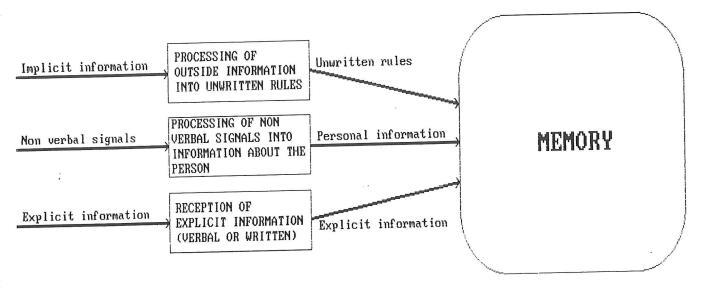
From the above, Asperger Syndrome appears not as one disability, but as a family of characteristics of which most have a disabling affect in our society. In most environments, characteristics A to G will frustrate a person's social and career aspirations, frequently reducing him/her to an undeserved position of insignificance. Continued frustration will exacerbate anxiety and induce a state of chronic depression as modelled in Fog 3. (This may be confirmable by characteristic levels of serotonin in the brain and the blood).

Given understanding and patient parents, an education in a school where teasing and bullying is eliminated and an occupation appropriate to interests and abilities, there is little reason for a person with Asperger Syndrome not to live a happy and fulfilled life.

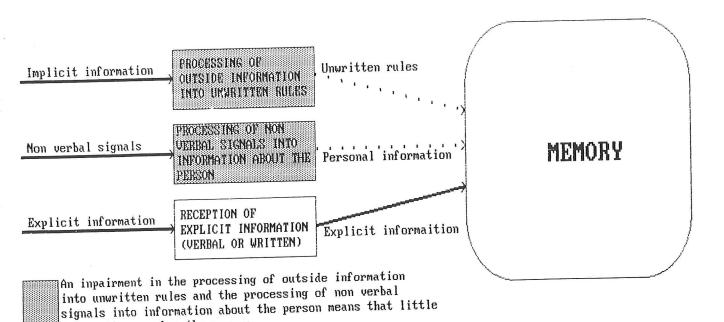

AN ASPERGER'S DISABLED PERSON

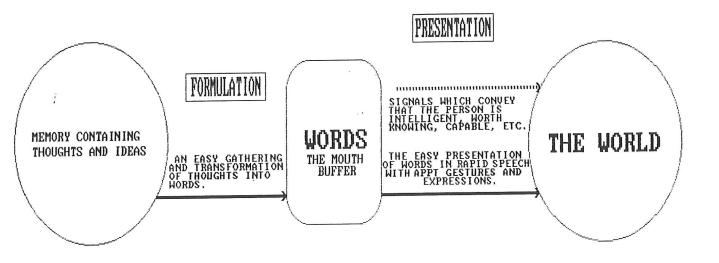

AN ASPERGER'S DISABLED PERSON

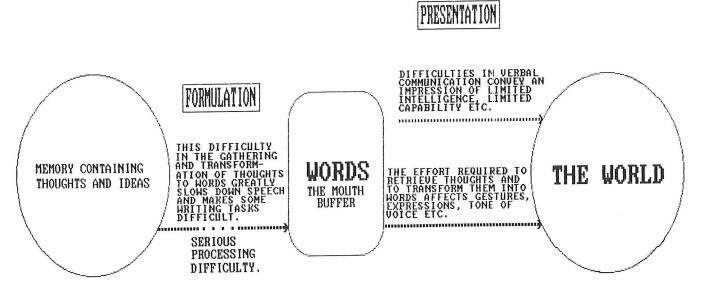
